GENERAL ABOUT THE CAMP

This camp is for Regular Education Girls and Boys ages 7 -17. This camp is <u>not</u> appropriate for <u>most</u> Special Needs participants of <u>If Wishes Were Hoses, Inc.</u> especially those with moderate to severe disabilities. Space is very limited. **Placement is limited by horse availability and their level of difficulty**. The camp is run by Margaret Fleet, Additional instructors & assistants.

Registration: Applications will be accepted immediately.

Remaining camp fees are due upon arrival on the first day of camp.

DEPOSIT: Please send (1) \$100.00 deposit along with your application (per application/rider) for all camp sessions.. **Camp Deposits are Non-Refundable.**

The remainder of your camp fee(s) will be due <u>upon arrival on the first day of each camp session requested/reserved.</u>

Cancellations: The camp deposit will not be refunded. Remaining fee(s) paid prior to the start of the reserved camp session will be refunded if cancellation is made one week prior to the start date of the reserved camp session.

Camp purchased by-the-day: \$65 per day Equestrian Camp. \$55 per day Horse Lover's Camp.

What to bring and wear: Bring a bagged lunch, snacks, and drinks each day. Wear long pants and protective shoes for riding (closed toes.) Boots are the best protection; tennis shoes are acceptable. Bring a change of clothes for after riding time (shorts, flip-flops, etc). Bring your riding helmet if you own one. Any other items needed will be listed in your conformation letter or notices sent home with campers during camp. Bring a WATER BOTTLE every day!

EACH TYPE OF CAMP SESSION

English/Western Equestrian Day Camp Monday – Thursday 8am – 2pm 4 day \$245 tuition/\$100 deposit L1 – L11 Arrival and Departure time: Riders should be at camp at 8:00 am and picked up by 2:00 pm. This is a camp focused on riding. End of Week Horse Show is on Thursday at 10:30am. Riders can expect to spend an average of 2 hours per day on their horses. Will contain both english and western riding disciplines (minimum age 8, minimum level 1- limited).

Activities will include grooming, saddling, riding, games, and showing – up to 2 hours of riding daily, horse care, horse theory, barn care. Ages 8 – 17. All levels - as horses are available - some weeks will not be able to host beginner riders.

Horse Lover's Day Camp Monday - Thursday 8am - 2pm 4 day \$200 tuition/\$100 deposit L1 - L7

Arrival and Departure time: Riders should be at camp at 8:00 am and picked up by 2:00pm. Day includes: hands on horse learning activities, grooming, saddling, mounting, riding lessons, trail rides, crafts, and games. Average riding time is 1 hour of riding daily. There will be 2-3 shifts of riders per horse. Riders will also show in shifts on show day between 10am-1pm depending on their assigned horse.

End of Week Horse Show is on Thursday at 10am and 11am (for 2 groups) or 10am, 11am, 12pm (for 3 groups). Ages 7-14.

<u>ALL CAMPS</u> ****Late departure <u>may or may not</u> be available upon request – make sure to clear departure times before hand. \$10 per hour. Bring a bagged lunch, snacks, drinks, and water daily. Microwave and Refrigerator available for riders. ****

DESCRIPTION OF LEVELS Beginner – Advanced

Description Of Levels. Your level is determined by the description that fits your ability in general.

BEGINNER LEVEL: 0-6 months up to 1 year of riding to advance through these levels.

Beginner I (L1) - A rider with little to no experience in regards to the care, handling, and riding of horses.

Beginner II (L2) – Rider may know some basic steering and stopping. Has spent time around horses, is familiar with safety concerns around horses. They have been introduced to trotting and are learning to sit and post trot. They may be able to lead a horse with some help, can brush a horse with help, not able to saddle/bridle independently.

Advanced Beginner (L3) –They understand safety concepts around horses and how to apply them. They know how to steer at the walk independently with no trouble. They know some about grooming/saddling. They are capable of trotting and steering at the sitting trot and posting trot, they may still hold on to horn/strap while trotting, steering is not consistent. (some riders may have cantered at this point, but in general they are not balanced and have trouble controlling the horse at the trot/canter).

NOVICE LEVEL: as little as 6months (minimum) up to 2 years of riding to reach these levels.

Novice I (L4) – Riders can comfortably control/steer a horse at the walk and are working on consistent trotting (Sitting and/or Posting) on the rail only. They know how to groom/ saddle/ unsaddle a horse, with help. These riders are comfortable on seasoned and safe horses that go slow and easily follow commands. They may still be self-focused in the arena – they still can't plan for others. They may have attempted to take a few steps of canter.

Novice II (L5) – Riders can comfortably control/steer a horse at the walk and trot. They have begun to master the sitting and posting trot basics. They can groom/saddle/unsaddle a horse with help. They still prefer safe, easy, gentle horses. They can make circles and other patterns while riding their horse at the walk and sometimes the trot, they can steer a horse on the rail and off the rail with safe passing and are aware of others in the arena. Older Students may have started cantering.

Advanced Novice (L6) – Riders can easily groom/saddle/untack/mount/walk/trot/and beginning canter, which they may be fairly comfortable with. They are working on correct posting diagonals, better control of their horse, up&down transitions, using leg, voice, rein, seat aids. They are proficient at basic arena patterns (circles, figure 8, serpentine) at the trot, passing, ring etiquette. They may have started on small cross rails or low verticals, they have begun to learn how to canter. They may still prefer safe, gentle, easy horses.

LOW INTERMEDITE LEVEL: From 2 years (minimum) of riding up to 6 years of riding to reach these levels.

Intermediate I (L7) – Riders can easily control a horse at the walk and trot and have begun to canter comfortably. They need very little help with grooming and saddling their horse. They have begun to ride more challenging horses, such as stubborn horses, or faster horses; the next level up. They are proficient at steering horses in any task, they can easily steer a horse through a pattern. They are beginning to understand more challenging concepts of riding. They use their aids to ride their horse more proficiently. They are comfortable with cross rails and low vertical rails. They can check and recognize their posting diagonals and have been introduced to canter leads, which they can sometimes tell.

Intermediate II (L8) - Riders can easily control their horse at the walk, trot, and canter. They can handle more difficult horses and challenging situations but they may sometimes get upset or scared. They still are riding intermediate level horses and are not masters on them, but are in a good working relationship with them, improving both their own riding and their skills at handling the more challenging horse. They can easily maneuver through arena patterns at the trot and have begun to work on patterns at the canter. In english may jump up to 2 feet. They begin to understand more advanced concepts of steering, training, and working with horses. Introduced to on the bit riding. Started course work. Knows different seats: light, full, half. Starting on Turn on the haunches, forehand, collection.

MID INTERMEDIATE LEVEL: From 6-10 years of riding to get to these levels.

Intermediate III (L9) –. Riders have all of the aforementioned skills and are starting to be able to ride harder horses that are unruly or very clever, and sometimes scary. They understand advanced concepts and can apply them. These include head setting, leg yielding, correcting bad behavior, dealing with bucking, rearing, etc. Solid course work. Jumps up to 3 feet.

Intermediate IV (**L10**) –Proficient in their area of riding. This rider is learning to train from the ground up and is learning to apply advanced riding concepts. This rider can handle most horses, in most situations. They can make most horses look calm, can "add life" to any horse, knows when to withdraw pressure, add pressure, understands what their horse is thinking, feeling, can fix any issue before it happens, can read their horse. Fully capable of contact, collection, all use of aids for all level horse. Makes a green horse look broke.

HIGH INTEMEDIATE to ADVANCED LEVEL: 10 years plus of riding to reach these levels.

Advanced Intermediate (L11) – Achievement of near expert level at handling horses. Very proficient to expert in their area of riding. This rider can handle young, spirited or difficult horses from the ground up. Makes them look broke or easy when ridden and handled. Knows and applies advanced horse training concepts. This rider can handle all levels and types of horses in all situations, with no fear. Has a subtle understanding of a horse that goes far beyond speed of horse or height of jump. Has all skills mentioned above. Probably will not be a child rider, but might be.

Advanced – an expert or professional in riding. Professionals should never stop learning.
